MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

OPENING CEREMONIES:

1. CALL TO ORDER:

The Torrance City Council convened in a Regular Meeting on Tuesday, October 5, 1976, at 5:30 P.M. in the Council Chambers at Torrance City Hall.

2. ROLL CALL:

Present: Councilmembers Armstrong, Brewster, Rossberg, and Wilson. Councilwoman Geissert arrived at 5:35 P.M.
Absent: Mayor Miller.

Also present: Assistant City Manager Scharfman, City Attorney Remelmeyer, Deputy City Clerk Moss and City Treasurer Rupert. Absent: City Manager Ferraro, City Clerk Coil.

In the absence of Mayor Miller, Mayor Pro Tem Wilson conducted the meeting.

3. FLAG SALUTE:

Water System Manager Borgwat led in the salute to the flag.

4. INVOCATION:

Reverend Boyd Kifer, Church of the Nazarene, provided the invocation for the meeting.

STANDARD MOTIONS:

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Councilman Armstrong moved to approve the minutes of September 21, 1976, as recorded. His motion was seconded by Councilman Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Councilwoman Geissert had not yet arrived at the meeting; Mayor Miller absent).

6. MOTION TO WAIVE FURTHER READING:

Councilman Brewster moved that after the City Clerk has given a number and read title to any resolution or ordinance on tonight's agenda, the further reading thereof be waived, reserving and guaranteeing to each Councilmember the right to demand the reading of any such resolution or ordinance in regular order. The motion was seconded by Councilman Brewster, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Councilwoman Geissert had not yet arrived at the meeting; Mayor Miller absent).

RESOLUTION NO. 76-206

Councilwoman Geissert moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 76-206. Her motion, seconded by Councilman Rossberg, was unanimously approved by roll call vote (Mayor Miller absent).

Councilman Armstrong moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 76-207. His motion was seconded by Councilwoman Geissert, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

11. REQUEST BY CITY OF REDONDO BEACH THAT THE CITY OF TORRANCE PARTICIPATE IN SIGNALIZATION OF RINDGE LANE AND 190TH STREET.

RECOMMENDATION OF DIRECTOR OF TRANSPORTATION:

That the City Council decline to participate in the funding for installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Rindge Lane and 190th Street.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the above stated recommendation of the Director of Transportation, with the intent being one of cooperation, but in recognition of the established priorities for the City of Torrance. The motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

12. PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS - DEL AMO BOULEVARD AT ENTRADERO AVENUE.

RECOMMENDATION OF TRAFFIC COMMISSION/POLICE DEPARTMENT:

Adoption of Alternative #3b: Signalization of Del Amo Boulevard and Entradero Avenue, including a separate pedestrian phase.

RECOMMENDATION OF DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION:

Adoption of Alternative 10A Modified as budgeted (flashing yellow signals and pedestrian island at Del Amo/Entradero); but has no objections to alternatives #2 (channelize pedestrians to Victor crossing) and #12 (signalize Del Amo/Entradero with southbound right turn only).

Staff presentation was provided by Sr. Associate Traffic Engineer Collins.

Present to reiterate expressed concerns regarding the traffic problems at the subject intersection and to urge signalization of same were: Miss Kathy Derouso, 19329 Flavian Avenue; Mark Duvall, 5409 Towers Street; Martin DeMont, 5522 Carmelynn; Ms. Barbara Mitchell, 5525 Wilma Street; Rose Lawson (?), 20530 Anza; and Manuel Deterra, 5505 Wilma Street.

Council discussion regarding the merits of the various alternatives followed. Generally favored was a modified 3b, with a built-in maximum delay to expedite traffic flow on Del Amo Boulevard -- consideration re: flashing signals on weekends was recommended by Councilman Armstrong.

Further review of 3b and 10a modified was recommended by Councilman Rossberg who MOVED to refer this matter back to the Traffic Commission and the Department of Transportation to "zero in" on 3b and 10a modified to the end that the best alternative may be achieved. The motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Wilson, but FAILED TO CARRY, with roll call vote as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Rossberg; Mayor Pro Tem Wilson.

NOES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Armstrong, Brewster, Geissert.

ABSENT: COUNCILMEMBERS: Mayor Miller.

Councilmembers Armstrong and Geissert indicated that their negative votes were for the reason that there has been sufficient study; Councilman Brewster had no particular objection to the motion, but, in his own mind, knows where he stands.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the recommendation of the Traffic Commission and Police Department for approval of alternative #3b, with a direction to Staff that a maximum delay be built in in order that there will be some assurance that east-west flow on Del Amo Boulevard will result -- further, that Staff return in one week with a report on the practicability of late night and weekend flashing signals on Del Amo. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Geissert, and roll call vote was as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Armstrong, Geissert, Mayor Pro Tem Wilson.

NOES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Brewster, Rossberg.**

ABSENT: COUNCILMEMBERS: Mayor Miller.

** Assistant City Manager Scharfman noted the requirement of four affirmative votes in order to approve the necessary appropriation of funds -- Councilman Rossberg thereupon changed his "no" vote to "yes", and the motion carried, 4-1.

Councilman Brewster indicated his preference for a widened crosswalk and lengthening of the island to the east, with a small railing and reflectors at each end of the island. Further, Mr. Brewster stated that he is not convinced that pedestrian safety is enhanced by a signal, and the accident experience at this intersection supports that theory. The modified alternative 10a would be the best solution, per Councilman Brewster.

Specifically commended by Councilman Armstrong were the efforts of Miss Kathy Derouso in this matter; Mayor Pro Tem Wilson directed that a letter of commendation go forward to Miss Derouso, with copies to her government teacher and school principal.

Noted by Assistant City Manager Scharfman was the fact that Miss Wolfsberger finished higher than any American has ever finished before in this particular competition -- it was his request that this fact be incorporated in the resolution; there was unanimous Council concurrence with this request.

(Arthur Olson)

Councilwoman Geissert moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2697 at its second and final reading. Her motion was seconded by Councilman Armstrong, and carried, with roll call vote as follows:

Councilwoman Geissert moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2698 at its second and final reading. Her motion, seconded by Councilman Armstrong, was unanimously approved by roll call vote (Mayor Miller absent).

Councilman Armstrong moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2699 at its second and final reading. His motion was seconded by Councilwoman Geissert, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

19. ORDINANCE NO. 2700.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ADDING ARTICLE 34 TO CHAPTER 2 OF DIVISION 9 OF THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE TO ESTABLISH A MEANS FOR AMENDING THE GENERAL PLAN

Councilman Rossberg moved for the adoption of Ordinance No. 2700 at its second and final reading. His motion, seconded by Councilman Armstrong, was unanimously approved by roll call vote (Mayor Miller absent).

PLANNING HEARING:

20. ZC 76-12, Torrance Planning Commission. Initiation by the Torrance Planning Commission of a Change of Zone from P-U to R-1 on property located on the east side of Ladeene Avenue between 236th and 238th Streets. RECOMMENDED FOR APPROVAL BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION.

An Affidavit of Publication was presented by Deputy City Clerk Moss, and it was ordered filed, there being no objection.

Mayor Pro Tem Wilson announced that this was the time and place for the public hearing on ZC 76-12, and inquired if anyone wished to be heard. There was no response.

Councilman Armstrong moved that the hearing be closed. His motion was seconded by Councilman Rossberg, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the recommendation of the Planning Commission and Planning Department for approval of ZC 76-12. The motion was seconded by Councilman Rossberg; roll call vote was as follows:

AYES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Armstrong, Rossberg; Mayor Pro Tem Wilson
 NOES: COUNCILMEMBERS: Brewster, Geissert
 ABSENT: COUNCILMEMBERS: Mayor Miller.

Regarding the negative votes cast, Councilman Brewster stated that he does not favor either rezoning or selling of the subject property -- Councilwoman Geissert would rather wait to dispose of the property.

PLANNING APPEAL:

21. CUP-RD 73-67 & PCR-RD 73-22, Joseph Weiss. Appeal of Planning Commission denial of a modification of a previously approved Conditional Use Permit and Planning Commission Review to allow loading doors fronting on Skypark Drive for industrial building on property located at the southwest corner of Skypark Drive and Madison Street. DENIED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION.

Affidavit of Publication was presented by Deputy City Clerk Moss, and it was ordered filed, there being no objection.

Mayor Pro Tem Wilson announced that this was the time and place for the subject hearing, and, following Staff presentation by Planning Associate Gomez, inquired if anyone wished to be heard. There was no response.

Councilman Armstrong moved that the hearing be closed. His motion was seconded by Councilman Rossberg, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

Council discussion was directed to the Staff recommendation that windows be permitted in the structure to facilitate the leasing of same -- concurrence was indicated by the Council.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with the recommendation of the Planning Commission and Planning Department; further, that window access be provided, subject to approval of the Planning Director. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Geissert, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

ROUTINE MATTERS:

22. AWARD OF CONTRACT - Columbia Park Baseball Diamond Lighting.

RECOMMENDATION OF PARK SERVICES ADMINISTRATOR:

That the contract be awarded to Witon Construction Company, Inc., and all other bids be rejected.

23. AWARD OF CONTRACT for 2 Street Sweepers
Ref. Bid #B76-38
Expenditure: \$55,330 (including Trade-Ins)

RECOMMENDATION OF FINANCE DIRECTOR/PURCHASING SUPERVISOR/
EQUIPMENT SUPERINTENDENT:

That Council approve the following:
Award #1: An award for one sweeper to the low bidder - Murphy Machinery Company - in the total amount of \$30,210.00, including tax. It is also recommended that Council approve of the purchase of the truck-dump optional accessory offered by the Murphy Machinery Company on their sweeper for the additional \$2,210.00 amount, including tax. It is our combined judgment that the time remaining for the City to be permitted to dump street sweeper loads onto City streets for pickup is becoming short. We believe that soon we will be required to dump directly into trucks and this option offered on the Murphy Unit will allow us to dump directly into a truck.

Award #2: The Murphy Machinery Company has offered the City of Torrance their existing Demonstrator Sweeper which is identical to the unit recommended above and is equipped with the truck-dump unit except that it has 180 hours total operating time on the unit. The City has been offered this unit for \$25,000.00 total price. This is a substantial savings. (Note: 180 hours operating time is like new time.)

Therefore, it is the recommendation of the Equipment Supt. and Purchasing that Council approve of the purchase of the DEMONSTRATOR Murphy Street Sweeper in the total amount of \$25,000.00.

Trade-ins:

It is further recommended that Council approve of the trade-in of the two City Street Sweepers being replaced (City Units #9100 and #9108) to the Murphy Machinery Company in the amount of \$1,000.00 per unit.

24. AWARD OF CONTRACT - Fire Department Rescue Tool.
Ref. Bid #B76-51
Expenditure: \$5,337.31

RECOMMENDATION OF FINANCE DIRECTOR/BUYER:

That Council accept the bid submitted by Western States Fire Apparatus of California, and approve of an award to them in the amount of \$5,337.31 including tax.

MOTION: Councilman Armstrong moved to concur with Staff recommendations on agenda items #22, 23, and #24. His motion was seconded by Councilman Rossberg, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

RESOLUTION NO. RA 76-211

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE CONSENTING TO A JOINT PUBLIC HEARING OF THE CITY COUNCIL AND THE REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ON THE PROPOSED REDEVELOPMENT PLAN AS CHANGED FOR THE SKYPARK REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT, AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A DATE THEREFOR, AND PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SAID JOINT PUBLIC HEARING

Councilman Armstrong moved for the adoption of Resolution No. 76-211. His motion was seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Wilson, and roll call vote was unanimously favorable (Mayor Miller absent).

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS:

26. Assistant City Manager Scharfman advised that there would be a quorum for the October 19th Council meeting.
27. City Attorney Remelmeyer requested a brief Executive Session following this meeting.
28. Mayor Pro Tem Wilson introduced Acting Park and Recreation Director Gene Barnett.
29. Councilman Armstrong advised that a professional commitment will necessitate his tardy arrival (approximately 9:15 P.M.) at the October 12th Council meeting.
30. Next noted by Councilman Armstrong was the fact that he will be in attendance at the League of California Cities meeting on October 19th, as a delegate. Mr. Armstrong reviewed legislative matters to be reviewed at the League meeting, and requested input on these issues from fellow Councilmembers.
31. Councilman Armstrong referred to a recent Western City article pertaining to "flag stops" employed by the San Diego Transit System, and requested review of this aspect by Director of Transportation Horkay.
32. The scheduling of a Finance Committee meeting to discuss Revenue Sharing Guidelines was requested by Councilwoman Geissert.
33. Councilwoman Geissert reviewed the recent meeting pertaining to the South Bay County movement, and requested a Staff report containing financial figures on possible pro/con arguments of the various compositions of a separate County which would reflect the advantages to Torrance.
34. Councilman Rossberg reported on action taken by the South Bay Cities Association regarding a South Bay County: the passing of pertinent resolutions, and the indication that they were going to put together a geographical area for a separate County and to petition for same.

Assistant City Manager Scharfman stated that Staff would provide certain data pertaining to family incomes, sales tax receipts per capita, present property tax rates, the service level in each City, etc.

35. Councilman Rossberg commended all responsible for the enjoyable Farewell Luau for retired Park and Recreation Director Van Bellehem.

At 8:00 P.M. the Council recessed for an Executive Session to discuss pending litigation (a proper subject matter, per City Attorney Remelmeyer).
