4. ANNOUNCEMENT OF WITHDRAWN, DEFERRED, AND/OR SUPPLEMENTAL ITEMS

5. REPORT FROM THE AIRPORT STAFF ON THE POSTING OF THE AGENDA

Members of the Commission spoke:

- Chair O'Brien suggested having a presentation from a lead at the Sling Pilot Academy to explain training methods to promote noise abatement.
- Commissioners Cohen, De Rago, and Gong replied that they are open to the idea of a presentation from a lead at the Sling Pilot Academy.

 - The Commission was provided an email regarding annual commission appointments schedule.
 - Repairs were done on the aprons and ramps.
 - A job walk took place regarding taxiway light repairs; taxiway Alpha and Bravo (all the way through Juliet) have been opened with temporary reflectors.
 - In preparation, Staff purchased materials to keep costs down; approximately 90-95% have been secured to date.

Environmental Quality Officer Nora Duncan presented an update on the Torrance Municipal Airport noise abatement:

- Staff and consultant have completed the execution of the Services Agreement.
- Consultant obtained a business license and assigned a project manager and an account manager to the City.
- Staff and Casper have held several virtual meetings.
- Subcontractor has inspected the noise monitoring terminals at least twice.
- Staff determined (1) monitor will stay in its current location; evaluations are still underway.
- Staff is working with the consultant to obtain permits for installation.
- Staff will meet with consultant bi-monthly for surety that project is on track and will provide updates to the Commission.
- Torrance Municipal Code, otherwise known as the Early Left Turn Code, Section 51.2.3(e), states that aircrafts taking off to the West shall not turn left until they have reached the ocean or gained an altitude of 1,500 feet; the Section was designed as a noise abatement program. The City Attorney received verification from the FAA that the Early Left Turn Code is not enforceable by the City, it is under the jurisdiction of the FAA exclusively.

Members of the Commission spoke.

 Chair O'Brien requested a presentation from a Caspar account executive to answer questions posed by the Commission and the public. Environmental Quality Officer Nora Duncan replied and suggested that Staff will investigate the matter closer to going live with the public-facing portion of the system. Environmental Quality Officer Nora Duncan stated that she will talk with Caspar staff during their next virtual meeting.

<u>MOTION</u>: Commissioner Gong moved to accept and file Items 7A and 7B; Item 7A pertaining to the monthly update of aeronautical operational information under the purview of the General Services Department, and Item 7B pertaining to the Torrance Municipal Airport (Zamperini Field) noise abatement update. Commissioner Cohen seconded the motion; a roll call vote reflected 4-0 approval (Commissioners Witherill and Zygielbaum absent).

The 341 hangars owned by the City are broken down into three size categories: small, medium, and executive. Of 341 total hangars, 74 were built by the City, while 267 hangars were funded by several private contractors. At time of construction, these hangars were built with individual preferences in mind and were not standardized according to size. Here are approximate sizes of small, medium and executive hangars.

Small Type B: 40'-41' Door Opening Width 800-1,200 sq. ft.

Medium: 52'-54' Door Opening Width 1,200-2,200 sq. ft.

Executive: 57'-61' Door Opening Width 2,200-3,200 sq. ft.

Current rates for hangars are: \$0.619/sq. ft. per month for Torrance Residents. \$0.694/sq. ft. per month for Non-Residents.

- 3/8/2022- 17:17- A Cessna C-170 aircraft upon landing incurred a prop and nose strike at 29R. Mobile 102 assisted with tow back to owner's hangar without further incident. TFD was not required.
- 3/23/2022- 10:45- A Sling aircraft upon landing veered off the runway and damaged a sign & light fixture on 29L.102 responded to the aircraft at 11R run-up area. Aircraft taxied back on its own and escorted by 102 to hangar without further incident. TFD was not required.

Definitions:

<u>ACCIDENTS</u>: An occurrence associated with the operation of an aircraft, which takes place between the time any person boards the aircraft with the intention of flight and all such persons have disembarked, and in which any person suffers death or serious injury, or in which the aircraft receives substantial damage.

SUBSTANTIAL DAMAGE means damage or failure which adversely affects the structural, strength, performance, or flight characteristics of the aircraft, and which would normally require major repair or replacement of the affected component. Engine failure or damage limited to an engine if only one engine fails or is damaged, bent fairings or cowling, dented skin, small punctured holes in the skin or fabric, ground damage to rotor or propeller blades, and damage to landing gear, wheels, tires, flaps, engine accessories, brakes, or wingtips are not considered "substantial damage".

SERIOUS INJURY means any injury which: (1) requires hospitalization for more than 48 hours, commencing within 7 days from the date the injury was received; (2) results in a fracture of any bone (except simple fractures of fingers, toes, or nose); (3) causes severe hemorrhages, nerve, muscle or tendon damage; (4) involves any internal organ; or (5) involves second or third degree burns; or any burns affecting more than 5% of the body surface.

<u>INCIDENT</u>: Any occurrence other than an accident associated with the operation of an aircraft, which affects or could affect the safety of operations.

NOTE: Per the FAA, Airport Operations totals will no longer be reported for the previous month. Due to automation, the totals will now be reported two months after they occur.



Since the last update at the Airport Commission meeting of April 14, 2022, the below actions have taken place or will need to take place.

- The Consultant (Casper) has ordered the equipment for the new ATC recorder and Noise Monitors.
- Casper has completed the specific design for the Noise system(s).
- · Casper and Staff are working on the Project Delivery documentation.
- Casper, Casper's subcontractor and Staff have decided that all noise monitors will remain in place, no movement is needed at this time.
- Before noise monitor installation, Casper's subcontractor will visit the monitor sites to make sure the sites are cleaned up and prepared for the installations.
- The Consultant is on track to have the noise monitors operational in June, barring any supply chain delays.
- Once the system is operational, it will be tested for approximately one week.
- Casper has set a tentative date for training Staff in June.
- Staff continues to meet with the Consultant bi-monthly to help keep the project on track and update Commission and City Council on a regular basis.

Staff will continue to update the Commission as the project progresses.

The Torrance Airport Storm Water Basin Project (Project) will divert, capture and treat urban storm water runoff up to 120 acre-feet per year from the cities of Torrance, Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills Estates, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills and LA County Unincorporated.

- Primary and Secondary Objectives:
 - To comply with the 2012 NPDES MS4 Permit requirements by capturing and diverting the volume of water from the 24-hour 85th Percentile storm runoff.
 - To improve the quality of Machado Lake by eliminating dry-weather runoff and reducing wet-weather pollutants transported in storm water such as Total Nitrogen, Total Phosphorous, Total Suspended Solids, bacteria, toxics, heavy metals, and petroleum products.
- Project Status Engineering Design Phase in progress.
- Est. Construction Cost: \$12,000,000





Project Location



- Project location is at Torrance Municipal Airport and is identified in the Machado Lake Enhanced Watershed Management Program (EWMP).
- Project is downstream of Palos Verdes Peninsula cities where storm water is comingled with drainage from Torrance prior to flowing into a major drainage system under the Torrance Airport.

• The Project will divert and store stormwater to later be pumped to the Joint Water Pollution Control Plant in the City of Carson for re-use as part of the Integration of Regional Projects to recharge groundwater.






Project Background

- Why was the Project Location selected? Public ownership and its proximity to two large storm drains with a total drainage area of about 3,841 acres.
- How was the Project developed? This project was identified in the Machado Lake EWMP as a high priority Project.
- City of Torrance, the Peninsula Cities and State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) worked together on Preliminary Design.
- Due to groundwater contamination, infiltration is not feasible.
- Benefits to municipality/municipalities: The cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills Estates, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills and LA County Unincorporated will benefit from this project in addressing the Machado Lake Nutrients and Toxics Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL).



The main elements of the Project include a diversion structure with peak flow of 25 cfs, conveyance pipes, 17 acreft storage units, and pump station to pump to the 15-inch sanitary sewer along Crenshaw Boulevard or back to Harbor City Park Multi-Benefit Stormwater Capture Project.

With the exception of access hatches and electrical panels, the sites will be restored to current conditions following construction.

STEP 1: Diversion of flow up to the 24-hr 85th Percentile storm runoff to CDS pretreatment unit through a X" diameter pipe.

STEP 2: Sediment and trash removal from diverted flow using CDS unit installed in a 8-ft diameter manhole. STEP 3: Temporary storage (up to 3 days) of pretreated flow in a concrete storage unit installed 20' below ground surface. Bottom of concrete storage unit sealed to prevent infiltration.

STEP 4: Discharge into sanitary sewer manhole.
