MINUTES OF AN ADJOURNED REGULAR MEETING OF THE TORRANCE CITY COUNCIL

1. CALL TO ORDER

The Torrance City Council convened in an adjourned regular session at 5:57 p.m. on Tuesday, March 22, 2016 in the Council Chamber at Torrance City Hall.

ROLL CALL

Agenda Item 18 was considered out of order at this time.

18. EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Furey announced that on Friday, March 18, subsequent to the posting of the agenda, the City received a settlement proposal in the case of Katie Bassilios v. City of Torrance, USDC Case No. CV-03059-SVW (JEMx), and the City Attorney has requested that the City Council consider discussing this matter in closed session this evening because he requires immediate instruction as time is of the essence. In order to take action on an item not on the agenda, the California Government Code requires a determination by a two-thirds vote of the Council that immediate action is necessary and that the need to take action arose subsequent to the posting of the agenda.

8G. SALE OF SURPLUS/OBSOLETE TRANSIT BUSES

Recommendation of the Transit Director that City Council authorize Ken Porter Auctions of Gardena, California to facilitate the sale of twenty surplus/obsolete transit buses from the Torrance fleet.

Charles Deemer requested information about Torrance Transit's bus fleet, which was provided by Transit Director Turner.

MOTION: Councilmember Ashcraft moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Goodrich and passed by unanimous vote.

8I. IMPLEMENTATION OF FREE PUBLIC WI-FI IN CITY COUNCIL CHAMBER

Recommendation of the Communications & Information Technology Director that City Council approve the implementation of free public Wi-Fi within City Council Chamber for an initial startup cost of \$7,215.00 and an ongoing annual cost of \$2,909.50 per year pending inclusion and funding approval in the future budget process.

Councilmember Griffiths requested that funding for the free public Wi-Fi in the Council Chamber be given a high priority in the upcoming budget process, citing the relatively small cost and the benefit to the community.

MOTION: Councilmember Griffiths moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Weideman and passed by unanimous vote.

8K. PUBLIC WORKS AGREEMENT RE WILSON PARK ELECTRICAL IMPROVEMENTS

Recommendation of the General Services Director that City Council:

- 1) Award a Public Works agreement contract with Bayline Electric of Torrance, CA in the amount of \$218,612.00 with a 5% contingency of \$10,930.60 for the Wilson Park Electrical Improvements Project (B2016-06); and
- 2) Approve a 10% project management fee of \$21,861.20; and
- 3) Waive a bid informality.

Mayor Furey commented on the Economic Development team's efforts to encourage Torrance-based businesses like Bayline Electric to bid on City contracts.

Councilmember Weideman commended staff for thoroughly investigating all of the companies that bid on the project and not just accepting the lowest bid.

<u>MOTION:</u> Councilmember Ashcraft moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Goodrich and passed by unanimous vote.

12. ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

12A. ACCEPTANCE OF LOW CARBON TRANSIT OPERATIONS PROGRAM FUNDING

Recommendation of the Transit Director that City Council adopt a Resolution authorizing the Transit Department to receive Low Carbon Transit Operations Program funds under the Greenhouse Gas Reduction fund.

James Lee, Transit Department, reviewed the staff recommendation, noting that the grant funds are to be used to upgrade portable bicycle racks on all Torrance Transit buses.

Charles Deemer requested clarification regarding this project's eligibility for grant funds, which was provided by staff.

MOTION: Councilmember Rizzo moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Barnett and passed by unanimous vote.

RESOLUTION NO. 2016-23

<u>MOTION:</u> Councilmember Griffiths moved to adopt Resolution No. 2016-23. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Barnett and passed by unanimous vote.

12B. APPROVAL OF DISTRIBUTION AREA AND PUBLIC NOTICE FOR FIREWORKS SHOW

Recommendation of the City Manager that City Council approve the distribution area and public notice for the residents surrounding the Civic Center in preparation for the Fireworks Show to be held on July 4, 2016, at the Torrance Civic Center.

Sr. Business Manager Minter reviewed the staff report and noted supplemental material available at the meeting.

Councilmember Ashcraft commented that she wished community input had been sought before the fireworks show was approved rather than after the fact.

MOTION: Councilmember Rizzo moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Barnett and passed by unanimous vote.

12C. AGREEMENT RE NORTH TORRANCE WELL FIELD PROJECT AND RECYCLED WATER RETROFITS AT SOUTH HIGH AND CALLE MAYOR MIDDLE SCHOOL

Recommendation of the Public Works Director that City Council:

- Approve the plans and specifications for the North Torrance Well Field Project, Phase II, I-108 and Recycled Water Retrofits for South High School and Calle Mayor Middle School (B2016-03); and
- 2) Award a two-year Public Works Agreement to PALP, Inc., dba Excel Paving Company of Long Beach, California, for an amount not-to-exceed \$2,164,034 to construct the North Torrance Well Field Project, Phase II, I-108, and Recycled Water Retrofits for South High School and Calle Mayor Middle School (B2016-03) and authorize a 5% contingency in the amount of \$108,201.

Engineering Manager Dettle reviewed the staff recommendation, noting that he recently learned that the City will be receiving a grant from the Bureau of Reclamations to cover the City's half of the costs for the Recycled Water Retrofits.

MOTION: Councilmember Rizzo moved to concur with the staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Barnett and passed by unanimous vote.

13. HEARINGS

13A. PROPOSED SERVICE IMPROVEMENTS TO TORRANCE TRANSIT LINE 4

Recommendation of the Transit Director that City Council approve the Transit Department's proposed Line 4 service improvements for summer 2016.

Mayor Furey announced that this was the time and place for a public hearing on this matter. City Clerk Poirier confirmed that the hearing was properly advertised.

Bradley Tolleson, Pamela Tang and David Mock of the Torrance Transit Planning and Design Team reviewed the proposed Line 4 service improvements and discussed public outreach efforts.

Councilmember Ashcraft commented positively on the proposal to offer express service to downtown Los Angeles on Saturdays, in addition to weekdays and requested that the Council be provided with information on ridership periodically.

Transit Director Turner offered to provide this information on a quarterly basis.

Mayor Furey invited public comment.

Charles Deemer requested information about the number of buses servicing Line 4, the location of bus stops, and the span of weekday service, which was provided by staff.

Leilani Kimmel-Dagostino requested information about senior bus fares, which was provided by staff.

MOTION: Councilmember Weideman moved to close the public hearing. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Rizzo and passed by unanimous vote.

Councilmember Rizzo voiced support for the proposed Line 4 service changes and commended staff for their efforts to seek community input and devise a plan that meets their needs.

<u>MOTION:</u> Councilmember Rizzo moved to approve the Line 4 service changes. The motion was seconded by Councilmember Barnett and passed by unanimous vote.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ADDING A NEW ARTICLE 49 OF CHAPTER 1 OF DIVISION 9 TO THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE ESTABLISHING A PLANNING COMMISSION REVIEW PROCESS FOR REQUESTS FOR ALTERATIONS AND DEMOLITION OF CONTRIBUTING AND ALTERED CONTRIBUTING RESIDENTIAL STRUCTURES IDENTIFIED IN THE HISTORIC RESOURCES SURVEY AND LOCATED ON PROPERTIES ZONED RESIDENTIAL WITHIN THE ORIGINAL TORRANCE TRACT AREA

City Clerk Poirier noted supplemental material correcting a scrivener's error in the agenda item.

- **17D.** Councilmember Griffiths requested the Council's concurrence to direct staff to return with an item to consider the removal of Patrick Furey, Jr. from the Traffic Commission if he chooses not to resign after receiving the letter requesting that he do so.
