### 7B. <u>DISCUSSION OF POTENTIAL DISSOLUTION OF THE TORRANCE GARDENS PERMIT PARKING DISTRICT</u>

Public Works Engineering Manager Moun presented Item 7B:

- The City of Torrance has (4) established Permit Parking Districts.
- The Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District was created January 1996 [Ordinance Number 3420] to address parking concerns that developed due to overflow on-street parking from industrial businesses on the north side of Maricopa, as well as visitors to the courthouse on Maple Avenue.
- In 2005, uses of the property on the north side of Maricopa changed as industrial uses were replaced by the Belmar, a residential community.
- In 2017, an Item was brought before the Commission to remove the parking restrictions on the north side of Maricopa to provide alternative parking to Belmar to reduce parking impacts in the Torrance Gardens neighborhood. This, along with the changed characteristic of the neighborhood, parking incursions in the Torrance Gardens area diminished significantly.
- Residents within the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District apply for parking permits through the Community Development Department, but there is no cost recovery in place for staff's oversight of the district.
- Should the Commission concur with staff's recommendation, staff will prepare a future Item to City Council to amend Torrance Municipal Code Section 61.6.32 to remove the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District.

Commissioner Suruki disclosed that she lives south of Torrance Gardens and visited the area.

Commissioner Suruki inquired on the objective of the Item. Public Works Engineering Manager Moun replied that recommendation of removal of the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District is based on staff's observation that there is ample parking within the area. The original reason why a Permit Parking District was established was due to overflow of employee parking in the neighborhood from the industrial on the north side of Maricopa, but now that the industrial use area has been taken over by Belmar, there is no longer an issue of overflow parking. There is ample parking in the area.

Commissioner Schwartz disclosed that she drove the Torrance Gardens neighborhood and would base decisions on facts presented.

Commissioner Schwartz requested information on parking permits enforcement in the community and how much a fine would be for a violation. Police Services Supervisor Newman replied that the fine is \$43 and that zero violations have been issued in the Torrance Gardens area.

Members of the public spoke.

<u>MOTION</u>: Commissioner Nichols moved to concur with staff's recommendation to prepare a future item requesting Council to amend the Torrance Municipal Code Section 61.6.32 to remove the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District. Commissioner Suruki seconded the motion. Motion carried 4-2 with Commissioner Gibson absent.

#### Purpose of the Commission

The Traffic Commission is a seven-member advisory body to the Torrance City Council on traffic policy matters. The Commission makes recommendations regarding street and traffic improvements and means of improving traffic conditions, operations, and safety.

The Traffic Commission is regularly scheduled to meet on the first Monday of each month at 7:00 P.M. All meetings are open to the public. The meetings for July 2023 to June 2024 were held in the West Annex. City staff in attendance generally include Brenda Moun, Public Works Engineering Manager; Shin Furukawa, Deputy Public Works Director/ City Engineer; David Koenig, Torrance Police Sergeant; and John Newman, Police Services Supervisor.

#### Summary of Annual Activities

The major topics discussed by the Traffic Commission were as follows:

Proposed All-Way STOP and East-West Pedestrian Crossing at Ocean Avenue and 227<sup>th</sup> Street At the November 6, 2023 meeting, staff conducted a follow-up meeting regarding the proposal to install an all-way STOP at the intersection of Ocean Avenue and 227<sup>th</sup> Street adjacent to Arnold Elementary School. The Commission concurred with staff's recommendation to install a new east-

west marked pedestrian crossing and two new STOP signs on Ocean Avenue to create an all-way STOP at the intersection of 227th Street.

#### Assembly Bill 413

At the February 5, 2024 meeting, staff made a presentation on State Assembly Bill 413 (AB 413) which amends the California Vehicle Code (CVC) Section 22500 to prohibit parking within 20 feet of the vehicle approach side of any marked or unmarked crosswalk to increase the safety of pedestrians. The practice called "Daylighting" is the technique of restricting parked cars adjacent to pedestrian crossings results in a wider driver sight triangle that allows drivers to see pedestrians and other vehicles sooner as they approach intersections.

### <u>Citywide Traffic Signal Improvements, T-171 (Lomita Boulevard at Madison Street Traffic Signal Installation)</u>

At the March 4, 2024 meeting, staff reported that the City successfully received Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) grant funding to construct a new traffic signal at the intersection of Lomita Boulevard and Madison Street. The project includes protected left-turn phasing for Lomita Boulevard; a new marked crosswalk on Lomita Boulevard on the east side of the intersection; and reconstruction of curb ramps, sidewalk, and curb and gutter. Additional improvements include pedestrian push buttons with the "touchless" feature and traffic signal heads with yellow reflectorized borders for enhanced visibility. The project is currently in design.

Traffic Conditions Adjacent to Calle Mayor Middle School on Mayor Drive and Juan Avenue
At the April 1, 2024 meeting, staff reported on findings of an investigation of congestion on Mayor
Drive between Calle Mayor and Juan Avenue adjacent to Calle Mayor Middle School caused by
two-way traffic on the narrow street during student drop-off and pick-up times. The Commission
took public input to better understand the experiences of affected residents, representatives from
Calle Mayor Middle School, and the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) members. Staff will take
into consideration the public input received and perform further analysis of potential modifications.

Traffic Conditions Adjacent to Edison Elementary School on 182<sup>nd</sup> Street and Doty Avenue
At the May 6, 2024 meeting, staff reported on findings of an investigation of the intersection of
182nd Street and Doty Avenue pertaining to the visibility of the crosswalk, location of existing
signage, and speeding on 182nd Street during student drop-off and pick-up times at Edison
Elementary School. Torrance Police Department also provided a briefing of their response to
traffic concerns in the area. Staff then took public input to better understand the experiences of
affected residents, representatives from Edison Elementary School, and the Parent-Teacher
Association (PTA) members. Staff will take into consideration the public input received and
perform further analysis of potential improvements.

#### I-405 at 182nd Street/Crenshaw Boulevard Operational Improvements, T-155

At the June 3, 2024 meeting, staff reported on the I-405 at 182nd Street/Crenshaw Blvd Operational Improvements, T-155 project including the goals to alleviate congestion, improve safety and enhance traffic flow and operational conditions on the I-405 mainline at the Crenshaw Boulevard/182<sup>nd</sup> Street Interchange, its on-and-off-ramps, and interfacing local arterials in the City of Torrance.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Director recommends that the Traffic Commission take additional public comment regarding the potential dissolution of the existing Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District.

#### BACKGROUND

The City of Torrance has four established permit parking districts within the City. The Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District contained within the area bounded by Maricopa Street to the north, Torrance Boulevard to the south, Crenshaw Boulevard to the east and Maple Avenue to the west (Attachment 1) was created in January 1996 via Ordinance No. 3420 to address parking concerns that developed because of overflow on-street parking on Maricopa Street and in the Torrance Gardens neighborhood from certain industrial businesses on the north side of Maricopa Street and by visitors to the Court House on Maple Avenue. The overflow parking resulted in limited on-street parking for residents in front of their homes and increased the danger of traffic collisions.

The Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District included the posting of signs on each street within the District that restricted on-street parking to a 2-HOUR period from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Excluded from the 2-HOUR parking restriction are vehicles displaying a parking permit issued by the City of Torrance. Only residents who reside within the Permit Parking District are eligible to receive parking permits.

Since 1996, uses of some properties on the north side of Maricopa Street between Hawaii Avenue and Alaska Avenue have changed due to redevelopment. Industrial uses have been replaced by residential or less dense commercial/industrial uses. In addition to the Belmar townhome development constructed in 2005 which provides adequate on-site parking to residents, the parking restrictions on the north side of Maricopa Avenue from Maple Avenue to approximately 1000 feet east of Hawaii Avenue was removed. As a result, the need for non-resident parking in the Torrance Gardens area has significantly decreased.

On August 5, 2024, the Traffic Commission took public input and discussed the potential dissolution of the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District (Attachment 2). During the public comment portion of the item, seven residents spoke in favor of keeping the Torrance Gardens permit parking district and one resident was indifferent. The City also received 39 email responses in favor of keeping the permit parking district.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Tonight's meeting will provide additional information and options in response to questions raised and statements made during the August 2024 Traffic Commission meeting. A public notice (Attachment 3) was mailed to all parcels within the District notifying residents of tonight's meeting.

#### Parking Requirements for Future Development

Assembly Bill 2097 as passed in 2022 prohibits a public agency from imposing any minimum automobile parking requirements on developments located with one-half mile of public transit, with certain exceptions. Based on the proximity of the Torrance Gardens neighborhood to the Mary K. Giordano Torrance Transit Center (within half mile of public transit), the City would be unable to impose minimum automobile parking requirements on nearby development projects, such as those that may be constructed within the City's Housing Corridor Overlay. This may potentially exacerbate parking demand in the Torrance Gardens neighborhood. Therefore, one option is to keep the existing District as-is and make no changes.

#### Modification of District Boundaries

Another option to consider is to maintain the parking district but modify the district boundaries to a smaller footprint. Based on the changed land uses and associated reduction in parking demand, some of the original conditions necessitating the formation of the parking district no longer exist. Therefore, one alternative is to maintain the parking district but shift the westerly boundary to Hickory Avenue. This option would maintain parking restrictions on streets where existing industrial uses remain on the north side of Maricopa Street. Another reduced district boundary option is to reduce the District to only the north half of the neighborhood, from Maricopa Street to approximately 600 feet south for all streets.

#### Permit Parking Signs

There are a total of 116 existing permit parking signs in the Torrance Gardens neighborhood. Based on recent investigation, 88 of the signs are damaged and/or faded. If the District is to remain, all the signs should all be replaced.

#### Permit Fees

Currently, residents within the existing permit parking district apply for the parking permit through the Community Development Department at no charge. There is no cost recovery mechanism currently in place for staff oversight and management of the district, including but not limited to: administrative costs to furnish and issue permits and maintain records; parking enforcement; and labor and material costs to install and maintain signs and posts. If directed by City management, the City may consider a fee study to implement a cost recovery mechanism in the future. User and regulatory fees are established by the City Council based on a fee study and are set according to the estimated reasonable cost of service and should bear a fair and reasonable relationship to the payer's burdens on, or benefits received from the activities and/or services provided by the City.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Public Works Director recommends that the Traffic Commission obtain public input and discuss the potential dissolution of the existing Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District bounded by Maricopa Street to the north, Torrance Boulevard to the south, Crenshaw Boulevard to the east, and Maple Avenue to the west.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City of Torrance has four established permit parking districts within the City. This item is to specifically discuss the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District which is contained within the area bounded by Maricopa Street to the north, Torrance Boulevard to the south, Crenshaw Boulevard to the east and Maple Avenue to the west (Attachment 1).

The Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District was created in January 1996 via Ordinance No. 3420 (Attachment 2) to address parking concerns that developed because of overflow on-street parking on Maricopa Street and in the Torrance Gardens neighborhood from certain industrial businesses on the north side of Maricopa Street and by visitors to the Court House on Maple Avenue. The overflow parking resulted in limited on-street parking for residents in front of their homes and increased the danger of traffic collisions.

The Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District included the posting of signs on each street within the District that restricted on-street parking to a 2-HOUR period from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Excluded from the 2-HOUR parking restriction are vehicles displaying a parking permit issued by the City of Torrance. Only residents who reside within the Permit Parking District are eligible to receive parking permits.

Since 1996, uses of properties on the north side of Maricopa Street have changed. Industrial uses have been replaced by residential or less dense commercial/industrial uses. As a result, parking incursions into the Torrance Gardens have diminished significantly. Additionally, parking incursions related to the Belmar townhome development constructed in 2005 were mitigated by removing parking restrictions on the north side of Maricopa Street in 2017.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Based on the changed characteristics of the neighborhood, staff is recommending the dissolution of the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District to eliminate permit parking. Currently, residents within the permit parking district apply for the parking permit through the Community Development Department; however, there is no cost recovery mechanism in place for staff oversight of the

District. The dissolution of the permit parking district would allow removal of existing signs that are faded and will improve neighborhood aesthetics. Should the Traffic Commission concur with staff's recommendation, staff will prepare a future item to the City Council to amend the Torrance Municipal Code Section 61.6.32 to remove the Torrance Gardens Permit Parking District.

Public input is an important part of the City's decision-making process. A public notice (Attachment 3) was mailed to 437 parcels notifying residents of tonight's meeting. Attachment 4 provides correspondence related to this item received prior to the posting of the agenda.



#### ORDINANCE NO. 3420 URGENCY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, ADDING SECTIONS 61.6.32 AND 61.6.33 TO THE TORRANCE MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING PARKING AND VEHICLE STOPPING IN A DESIGNATED AREA OF THE CITY AND DECLARING THE PRESENCE OF AN URGENCY.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does hereby ordain as follows:

#### SECTION 1

That new Sections 61.6.32 and 6.1.6.33 shall be added to the Torrance Municipal Code to read in their entirety as follows:

#### "SECTION 61.6.32 - 2-HOUR PARKING - RESIDENTIAL PERMITS

A limited time parking district is hereby established within the City, composed of those streets bounded by Maple Street on the west, including the east side of Maple Street, Maricopa Street on the north including the south side of Maricopa Street, Crenshaw Blvd. on the east, including the west side of Crenshaw Blvd. and Torrance Blvd. on the south, including both sides of the service road. Within the limited time parking district, there will be 2-hour parking during the hours of 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM, Monday through Friday excluding holidays. Excepted from this limitation are the vehicles of those residents of the district, or guests, which display a sign, sticker or other identification which has been issued by the City of Torrance.

#### SECTION 61.6.33 - NO STOPPING - MARICOPA STREET

There shall be no stopping any time along the north side of Maricopa Street, for west bound traffic, between Crenshaw Blvd. and Hawaii Ave."

#### **SECTION 2**



The facts upon which this ordinance is declared to be an urgency measure are as follows:

Within the area bounded on the west by Maple Ave., the north by Maricopa Street, the east by Crenshaw Blvd. and the south by Torrance Blvd., a severe parking problem has developed because of overflow parking from certain industries abutting Maricopa St. on the north and by visitors to the Court House on Maple Ave. This has resulted in a great number of cars parked on the streets within the area, thereby depriving the home owners the use of parking spaces in front of their homes and increasing the danger of traffic collisions because of the number of cars parked along Maricopa street, blocking the views from driveways. It is imperative that these measures become effective immediately to protect the health, safety and welfare of the workers and residents alike.

#### **SECTION 3**

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

#### SECTION 4

Any person violating any of the provisions of the Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine as provided for in Section 36900 of the California Government Code.

#### **SECTION 5**

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately after the passage and adoption thereof, and the City Clerk will certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the <u>Daily Breeze</u>, a daily newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the City of Torrance.


